# Judicial review and democratization in francophone West Africa – a comparative constitutional law analysis

## **Project Background**

- After World War II judicial review of constitutionality has expanded around the world. Starting with the political liberalization of the early 1990s the establishment of centralized institutions with judicial review power (in form of courts or councils, see map) has become a fundamental element of democratic constitutional reforms in Africa.
- > Most of these jurisdictions have thus been (re-) designed in the light of democratic transition and consolidation.
- > French constitutional models of the Gaullist Fifth Republic have influenced constitution-making in francophone Africa.
- Francophone Africa has not featured significantly in European and international research (outside of francophone academia).

### **Main Arguments**

- The context of political transition and the revival of constitutionalism formed a basis for effective judicial review to prosper in Africa.
- By designing jurisdictions with evolved features many states went further than the French model of a Conseil Constitutionnel, so that powerfully equipped constitutional courts could emerge in some countries.
- Effective judicial review can facilitate conflict resolution and add to the stability of the constitutional and political order.
- The West African experience provides valuable insights for comparative research on judicial review institutions and comparative constitutionalism worldwide.




