Qualification goals:

- Speech: ability to respond appropriately in different contexts (for student teachers, especially with regard to interaction in the classroom) using the appropriate vocabulary, and the ability to independently create a longer speech, even on complex issues, in a fluent language.
- Writing: ability to compose clearly structured and fluent texts, also on complex issues, as well as ability to produce different text types in a targeted group-oriented language.
- Methodological skills: training in job-related presentation techniques, skills for appropriate participation in and moderation of discussions as well as for writing term papers, project reports or literary reports.

Contents:

- Speech: systematic overview of the basics of the English linguistic system. Gradual step-by-step training and advancement in English grammar, pronunciation, idioms, listening as well as text comprehension and production.

- Socio-cultural content: introduction to the English-speaking reference cultures (e.g. the political system in the USA), cultural studies and cultural-historical topics (e.g. intercultural relationships) as well as topics relevant to the subject.

Qualification goals:

- Comprehension: largely fluent comprehension of complex literary and factual texts, including specialized and/or scientific texts, on subjects both within and outside the field of study; ability to recognise and respond to stylistic differences; ability to understand and correctly interpret the implied verbal, paraverbal and non-verbal elements of extended speech and cinematic representations.
- Speech: ability to produce appropriate and fluent speech even in unprepared situations; both an increased degree of linguistic flexibility in everyday situations and elaborated linguistic skills in professional interaction.

The UNICert® final exam for the UNICert® certificate III, level C1 with the Academic English profile may be sat as part of modules 05-BA-A-005 and 05-BA-A-006. The prerequisites and format of the UNICert® training are regulated in the UNICert® framework.

A separate cross-module UNICert® examination exists for the attainment of an UNICert® III certificate. With a total scope of at least 200 minutes, it includes the examination parts of listening comprehension, reading comprehension, written expression and oral expression, which are equally important for the UNICert® final grade. Inadequate exam performance in one of the four skills cannot be compensated for by better performance in other parts of the exam.

Eligibility is a language level assessment (level B2) at the beginning of the program and a pass of the exams in the four above mentioned courses.

Qualification goals: the goals in literary, cultural and media studies include an introduction to central methods, concepts and theories of Anglophone literary, cultural and media studies, the ability to critically examine and apply these on scientific specialist texts, as well as the ability to develop arguments in different written and oral forms (e.g. presentation, response essays) in the foreign language.

The linguistic analysis goals include in-depth knowledge of areas of application, strengths and weaknesses of advanced methods of linguistics; ability to design and present research projects, to obtain data material and to create corresponding data bases, as well as to apply methods independently in the context of research projects; ability to obtain and analyse scientific literature for research projects. The ability to present and discuss scientific knowledge in written and/or oral form (e.g. presentations, response essays) in the foreign language.

Contents: the literary, cultural and media studies contents include discussions of selected examples of Anglophone literary, cultural and media studies and their theories and concepts, case-study analyses of literary and media genres, as well as introductions to academic writing and research in Anglophone Literary, cultural and media studies.

The content of the linguistic studies includes an overview of theoretical basics and advanced methods from core areas of linguistics, e.g. methods of corpus linguistics, sociolinguistics, as well as data generation (e.g. field research) and statistics.

Application and advancement of presentation and discussion techniques.
