- Particular focus in the role of film adaptation analysis. Furthermore, consideration of other medialised forms of literature. This concerns, for example, the role of literary texts in theatre, in broadcasting, arts pages, television or museums, as well as new forms of internet literature (blogs, etc.)
- Issues surrounding media socialisation will be discussed, taking into consideration problems of reading in the context of media competition.
